Excerpt from Soil Survey of Shelby County, Kentucky, 1919 Shelby County, Kentucky, lies in the north-central part of the State nearly midway between the cities of Louisville and Lexington. Oldham and Henry Counties bound it on the north, Franklin and Anderson Counties on the east, Spencer County on the south, and Jefferson County on the west. The county is irregular in shape, with a length and width through Shelbyville, near its center, of 18 and 22 miles, respectively. Its total area is 382 square miles or 244,480 acres. Shelby County embraces a portion of an extensive general physiographic division of central and north-central Kentucky, known as the Lexington Plain. Viewed as a whole, this is an undulating, gently sloping plain. In Shelby County the slope is toward the west. The degree of dissection of this plain varies in different parts, and the county may be divided according to the local relief, determined largely by erosion, into three divisions. These are, as a rule, fairly well defined, although topography typical of one division may be found within the...
